The Benefits of Involvement


For Schools this project supports and encourages staff development to connect curriculum to outdoor classrooms in the most effective way.

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Environmental Youth Connections (EYC)

This EYC project will provide a direct connection between environmental learning experiences for Waupaca County youth and adult residents to local parks, trails and natural resources areas.



This will be accomplished by:

- Inventory of Environmental Education
- Identify barriers in Environmental Education and site utilization
- Support resource development (maps, kits, lesson plans)
- Training or professional development plan
- Distribution and communication plan
- Evaluation
- EYC Advisory Board

For our youth who will soon become caretakers of our natural resource areas, we will be able to document:

During Environmental Education sessions at a local park, volunteers asked how many youth had visited the park before. About 75% had not!

EYC Outcomes

- increased awareness of natural resource areas,
- increased knowledge through hands on environmental education experiences,
- increased availability of environmental education resources
- increased numbers and capacity of professionals, teachers and volunteers to conduct environmental education experiences for youth in our natural resource areas of Waupaca County and its communities.



A UW-Extension countywide survey revealed that professionals whose jobs connect to natural resource areas identified a need to serve more youth and citizens, to have access to more resources, to have opportunities for staff and volunteers to create resources that are age and site appropriate, and to create an advisory committee that can long term support environmental education and preservation in Waupaca County and their communities.

Local Research

UW-SP masters study of Waupaca Educators revealed that 88% of teachers indicated a need for more in-service training and curriculum on environmental education. Seventy-seven percent of teachers would like to greater utilize local environmental properties. Seventy-nine percent need or need access to environmental education equipment.

In 1991 a study of three generations of 9 year olds found that the radius around the home where children were allowed to roam and play shrunk to a ninth of what it had been in 1970. **American Demographics**
